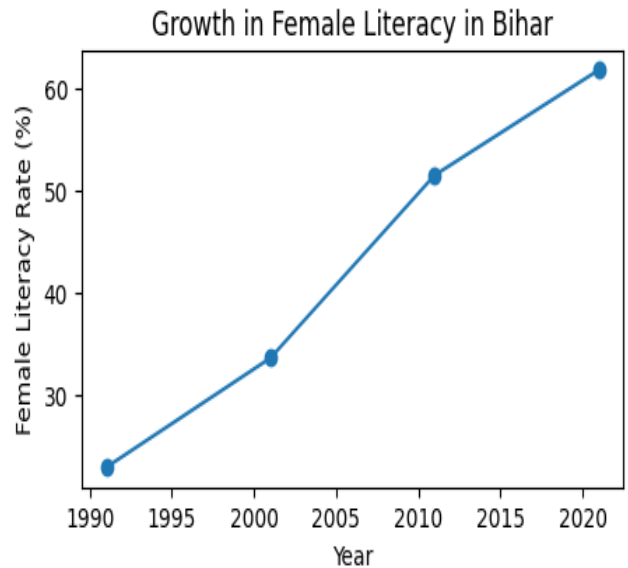
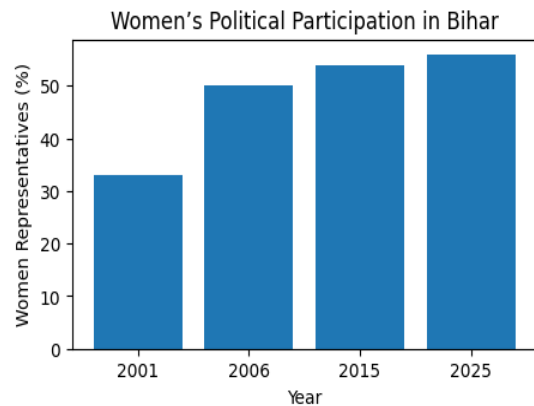


Table 1: Female Literacy Rate in Bihar
